HUNGARIAN CULTURE – HUNGARIAN IDENTITIES AS REFLECTED IN ART, FILM AND LITERATURE

This course intends to give you an opportunity to explore certain aspects of Hungarian attitudes, thinking and cultural traditions. The notion and scope of "culture" being nearly all-encompassing and the selection from it inevitably individual, the main goal is to trace basic trends and themes, as well as to highlight the figures and works of some of the most outstanding representatives of Hungarian *history and politics*, *literature, music, film and fine arts.* The program may allow for some adjustments, taking into account your preferences.

Some of the classes will center around an *issue that is relevant* in today's Hungary, to be examined in its *historical context*, and how it is *reflected in emblematic works of art*, mostly from the twentieth century. Others will be aimed at giving an *overview of a particular branch of art*, and there will be sessions devoted to more *detailed discussions of individual works (of literature and film art)*.

On several occasions, you will be asked to do some *brief, preliminary research* or a *personal interview,* and *share* your findings in class.

Besides, you will be asked to give 2 presentations. The first one will be about your field trip (in pairs) exploring some parts of *Budapest* (with an obvious emphasis on architecture), whereas the second, *final assignment* will be about a topic of your own choice, more or less close to your heart, to be presented in the exam week.

You will also be encouraged to take advantage of "live" Hungarian culture. Depending on interest, our program will include a theatre program and a guided tour of the National Gallery (to be scheduled outside the regular class time!!)

During the term, you will be required to

- read
 - poems and short stories, collected in a Reader
 - 3 short novels
 - The Paul Street Boys by Ferenc Molnár
 - Anna Édes by Dezső Kosztolányi
 - Fateless by Imre Kertész
- give some mini and 2 longer presentations (see intro)
- write a midterm paper (take-home) and a short final essay (take-home)
- (recommended only ©) keep a journal about your impressions, opinions, comments

<u>Course evaluation</u> will be based on the following criteria: Preparation - participation 25 % Midterm paper - Final presentation and essay 25% - 25 % Mini and Budapest presentations – 25%

<u>Attendance</u> is mandatory - more than 3 absences will result in failing the class.
